## 2009 Outlook

The Delaware State Baseball Team enters the 2009 season looking to regain its championship form in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC). The senior-laden squad (12 seniors) will take the field this season, returning five starting field position players and five pitchers with 15-or-more appearances a year ago. Head Coach J.P. Blandin enters his ninth campaign with the goal of returning DSU to prominence in college baseball.

Despite a 16-33 (11-7 MEAC) record last year, Coach Blandin will use the knowledge gained from a disappointing '08 season. Blending the experience of 17 returning letterwinners along with 10 newcomers, this year's squad appears to be poised to earn the school's first winning record since 2004.

Bittner finished the 2008 season hitting .324 with 10 home runs and a team-high 51 RBI. Appearing in 47 games, Bittner was second on the team and 10th in the MEAC in batting average and was the team leader in RBI (51), total bases (102), slugging pct. (.590) and walks (26). A first-team All-MEAC selection, Bittner was second on the team, and fifth in the MEAC in home runs hit.

Sanchez, a 2009 Preseason Wallace Watch List honoree, was the only Hornet to start all 49 games last season. Sanchez hit a team-best .347 (No. 5 in the MEAC) with six home runs and 30 RBI.

The team leader in runs scored in '08, Sanchez registered 16 doubles and an on-base percentage of .446. Sanchez was named to the All-MEAC Second Team last season.

Weather, a second-team All-MEAC selection last season, hit .278 with two home runs and 20 RBI. Weather competed in 35 games, including 39 as a starter. He was also credited with 11 runs scored, six doubles and a triple in 2008.

Topping the list of returning everyday players are second baseman Justin Bittner (Newark, Del.), shortstop Jose Sanchez (Tachira, Venezuela) and catcher Wynton Weather (Virginia Beach, Va.).

The Hornets also return senior outfielders James Johnson (Dover, Del.) and Jared Lineweaver (Georgetown, Del.), and sophomore infielder Jose Portela (Vega Baja, Puerto Rico).

Johnson competed in 44 games, starting 38, finishing fifth on the Hornets with a .295 batting average. Johnson was second on the team with 42 runs scored, and third in hits (46) and at-bats (156).

Lineweaver was limited to 13 games last season due to knee injury. The outfielder batted .400 (16-for-40) with a homer, four doubles and four runs scored. The lead-off batter had six multi-hit games.

Portela enters his second season with the Hornets following a 2008 season in which the Vega Baja, Puerto Rico, native competed in 39 games, starting in 32. Portela batted .273 with 25 runs scored, three home runs and 27 RBI.

On the mound, the Hornets return their top pitcher in right-hander Josh Schmidt (Middle-town, Del.). Schmidt was an All-MEAC Second Team selection in '08, leading DSU with 80 strikeouts (No. 3 in the MEAC). Schmidt made 13 appearances, finishing the season with a 7-5 record and a 5.00 ERA in 72 innings pitched.

Also returning to the mound for the Hornets this season will be Mike Ingram (Newark, Del.) and Bryan Perkins (Newark, Del.).

Ingram tallied an 0-4 record with a 7.68 ERA in 38 and two-thirds innings pitched. The right-hander struck out 22 batters in 15 appearances.

B. Perkins made 17 appearances last season, striking out 19 hitters in 22 innings pitched. His brother Dan Perkins is expected to make significant contributions, coming off Tommy John Surgery last year.

Also expected to see time on the mound is Bittner, who registered a 1-1 record with a 6.35 ERA in 11 and one-third innings pitched. The right-handed hurler recorded seven strikeouts last year.

Also expected to see time on the mound are junior college transfer Shane Foreman (Wilcox, Ariz. – Eastern Arizona JC), freshman Jordan Elliott (Milford, Del.) and junior college transfer Brandon Penick (Phoenix, Ariz. – Phoenix JC).

## Head Coach J.P. Blandin - Ninth Season



Blandin has compiled a 204-200-4 record since taking over as head coach of the Hornets prior to the 2001 season. In his ninth season as the Hornets' skipper, Blandin has accounted for nearly 30 percent of the school's total wins (731 in 52 seasons). Blandin picked up his 200th-career victory with a 10-6 win over the

Delaware Blue Hens on April 8, 2008, reaching the 200-win plateau in 394 games (fewer games than any other coach in school history). Prior to last season's milestone, he reached the 100-win mark faster than any coach in team history, achieving the milestone in 151 games. Blandin led the Hornets to the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) Northern Division crown in each of his first three seasons. In MEAC play, Blandin has amassed an 88-36 (.710) record.

Last season, Blandin guided DSU to a 16-33 record, finishing fourth in the MEAC with an 11-7 conference record. Despite the disappointing 16-33 record, he had five all-conference selections including All-MEAC First Team honorees Justin Bittner and Jarrett Bibb.

In 2007, Blandin registered a 22-27-2 record (10-8 MEAC), featuring All-MEAC First Team selection Tom Shelley. During the previous two years, DSU went 18-36-2 (7-11 MEAC) in 2006 and 19-27 (10-7 MEAC) in 2005. Third baseman Brandon Gravely was recognized as a First Team All-MEAC selection in '06, while second baseman Kevin Hill picked up first team all-conference honors in '05.

In 2004, he guided the Hornets to the MEAC Tournament championship round for the first time since 1993. The 2004 season also featured the selection of RHP Shawn Phillips and 1B Bret Underwood to the All-MEAC First Team. Phillips (Texas Rangers) and fellow RHP Eric Carter (Seattle Mariners) were also chosen in the 2004 Major League Baseball draft.

In 2003, Blandin led Delaware State to its first season-series victory over the University of Delaware, winning four of six games against its in-state rival. The 2003 Hornets also produced two All-MEAC First Team players, OF Scott Martin and Underwood. The Chicago White Sox selected Martin, and RHP Tim Vaillancourt was chosen by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 2003 Major League Baseball amateur draft.

In 2002, Blandin guided Delaware State to a school-record 40 wins (40-19), eclipsing the former record of 37 set by his 2001 squad. The 2002 Hornets posted a school-record-tying 12-game winning streak, and ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in batting average, runs scored and earned run average. Blandin's 2002 squad also es-

tablished new school records for runs scored (555), hits (668), home runs (68) and runs batted in (489). Among the individual honors collected by Blandin's 2002 team were the selection of Martin (DH) and Phil Sullinger (OF) to the All-MEAC First Team, and pitcher Phillips as MEAC Rookie-of-the-Year. Blandin's 2001 team led all NCAA Division one schools in scoring at 10.4 runs per game, and earned run average (2.98). Delaware State pitchers tossed a school record eight shutouts that season, while the hitters established new team marks in four categories. The 2001 Hornets also posted a school-record winning streak of 12 games. After a loss to Georgetown ended the streak, the Hornets responded by winning their next 11 games. The 2001 All-MEAC First Team featured two Delaware State players (Martin - INF, Dave Stevens - C), while pitcher Joe Brzeczek was named MEAC Rookie-of-the-Year.

Prior to accepting the head-coaching job, Blandin served as an assistant/pitching coach for the Hornets during the 2000 season. He is credited for the dramatic turnaround in the pitching staff that season. Delaware State allowed fewer runs per game and had a lower ERA than the year before his arrival. Hornet opponents averaged 6.65 runs per game in 2000 compared to 9.6 in 1999. The team ERA fell from 8.24 in 1999 to 5.21 in 2000. Blandin was also instrumental in the development of lefty starter John Sterling, the 2000 MEAC Rookie-of-the-Year.

Prior to joining the Hornets, Blandin served as an assistant coach at the University of San Francisco in 1998. While there, he assisted in the development of current San Francisco Giants pitcher Jesse Foppert.

Blandin was also an undergraduate assistant at his alma mater, Wilmington (Del.) College, during the 1994 season. That year, Wilmington qualified for the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) World Series in Des Moines, Iowa. As a player at Wilmington, Blandin help lead the 1992 Wildcats to a fourth place finish in the 18-team



NAIA World Series. He also earned a letter during the 1993 season.

During his high school days at St. Andrew's in Delaware, Blandin was an All-State pitcher in 1988, and earned a spot on the state's Carpenter Cup All-Star team. The Carpenter Cup pitted all-star teams from throughout the Delaware Valley in competition at Philadelphia's Veterans Stadium. The Middletown, Del., native has been highly successful at attracting some of Delaware's top high school players to sign with the Hornets. About 80 percent of Blandin's players competed at Delaware high schools, including a number of all-state selections. Blandin and wife Sherry reside in Dover with their daughter Kaylee (6) and son Tyler (5).

He and his wife, Sandy, reside in Newark, Del., and are expecting their first child in April.



## **Assistant Coach Russ Steinhorn - First Season**

Steinhorn enters his first season as the pitching coach, handling all the responsibilities of the pitching staff. Steinhorn was just recently the pitching coach for the Allegany County Nitros in the New York Collegiate Baseball League with current assistant coach, Mike August. Steinhorn has also been a pitching instructor for college camps and showcases all over the country. He also coached one year at his alma mater Edgewater High School in Orlando, Fla.

Steinhorn graduated from Southeastern University in Lakeland, Fla. While at Southeastern they won 4 NCCAA (National Christian College Athletic Association) national championships. He was a two-way player mostly pitching while playing second base and left field. During his last season, he was 5-1 with a 2.70 ERA and batted .373. The Southeastern graduate earned a degree in mathematics education and a minor in religious studies in the spring of 2008.

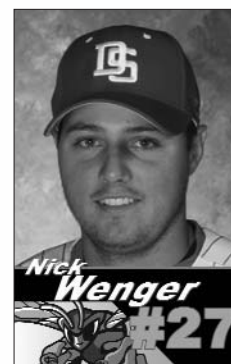
Steinhorn currently lives in Dover and is working on his master's degree in sports administration from Delaware State University.



## **Assistant Coach Nick Wenger - Second Season**

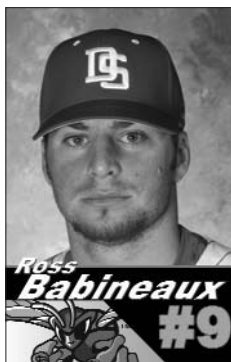

## The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference

The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC), a NCAA Division I Conference, is in its 38th year of operation heading into the 2008-2009 academic school year. Housed in the Armada Hoffer Tower at Town Center of Virginia Beach, Virginia, the MEAC is made up of 12 outstanding, historically black institutions across the Atlantic coastline: Bethune-Cookman University, Coppin State University, Delaware State University, Florida A&M University, Hampton University, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, Norfolk State University, North Carolina A&T State University, South Carolina State University and Winston-Salem State University.

### HISTORY

In 1969, a bold ad hoc group of innovators long associated with intercollegiate athletics met in Durham, N.C., to discuss the feasibility of organizing a new conference. Dissected from these discussions, a steering and planning committee was formed to fully investigate the idea, present a detailed report with recommendations to interested collegiate institutions, and then construct a workshop to outline proposals. After adopting a program, seven institutions (Delaware State College, Howard University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Morgan State University, North Carolina A&T State University, North Carolina Central University and South Carolina State College) agreed to become the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. Its major objective was to establish, organize and supervise an intercollegiate athletic program among a compact group of educational institutions of high academic standards and with a sound philosophy of co-curricular activities.

The conference was confirmed in 1970, kicking off its first season of competition in football in 1971. In 1978, a milestone was reached when the MEAC selected Kenneth A. Free to be its first full-time commissioner. He had been preceded by three interim (part-time) commissioners: Dr. Leroy Walker (1971-74); who later had the distinction of serving as the President of the United States Olympic Committee, the late Earl Mason (1974-75) and the late Dr. James Young (1975-78).

Kenneth A. Free served the conference for 18 years before stepping down in 1995. In 1996, Charles S. Harris was named commissioner and served in the capacity until April 2002. Longtime MEAC administrator Brenda H. McCoy served two stints as Interim Commissioner, one in 1996 and again in 2002. On September 1, 2002, Dr. Dennis E. Thomas was named the commissioner and has served in the position for six years.

The leagues' first expansion occurred in October 1979 when Bethune-Cookman College and Florida A&M University were voted into the MEAC as new members. Original members Morgan State, North Carolina Central and Maryland Eastern Shore withdrew from the conference at the end of the 1979 fiscal year. Maryland Eastern Shore was readmitted in 1981 and

Morgan State returned in 1984. Florida A&M opted to resign in 1984, but was readmitted in 1986. Coppin State College was granted admittance in 1985, becoming the ninth member institution. The MEAC expanded again in the 90's with the inclusion of Hampton University (1995) and Norfolk State University (1997). The final expansion occurred in 2007, with the addition of Winston-Salem State University.

On June 8, 1980, the MEAC was classified as a Division I conference by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). The following month the MEAC received an automatic berth to the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

Currently, the league has automatic qualifying bids for NCAA postseason play in baseball (since 1994), men's basketball (since 1981), women's basketball (since 1982), football (since 1996), softball (since 1995), men and women's tennis (since 1998), and volleyball (since 1994).

### SPORTS HIGHLIGHTS

The MEAC has enjoyed great athletic success over the years. In 2008, Maryland Eastern Shore defeated Arkansas State, 4-2 to win the NCAA Women's Bowling National Championship, the first in conference and school history. Lady Hawks' head coach Sharon Brummell became the first female head coach to win a NCAA bowling title.

In men's basketball, Morgan State won the 1974 NCAA College Division II National Championship. The 1981 tournament champion Howard Bison became the first MEAC team to play in the NCAA Division I Basketball Championship. MEAC tournament runners-up North Carolina A&T was invited to play in the National Invitational Tournament (NIT) during the same season. Coppin State and Hampton also made history in the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament with first-round victories. The No. 15 seeded Coppin State defeated No. 2 South Carolina in 1997 and No. 15 seeded Hampton defeated No. 2 Iowa State in 2001. Both victories ranked among the Top 10 greatest tournament upsets of all-time by ESPN's SportsCenter.

In women's basketball, South Carolina State won the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (IAIW) Division II National Championship in 1979. In 1982, Howard became the first MEAC women's team to participate in the NCAA Division I Basketball Championships. South Carolina State earned the berth in 1983 and became the first MEAC team, men or women, to win a first-round game in the NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament.

Coppin State, winners of back-to-back conference tournaments in 2005 and 2006, earned a berth to the 2007 WNIT. The Lady Eagles defeated Saint Joseph's in the first round to earn their first Division I postseason victory.

In football, prior to the establishment of Division I-AA competition, the MEAC football champion played in the Gold Bowl held in Richmond, Va., which matched them against the champion of the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA). South Carolina State represented the MEAC in 1977 and 1978, winning both outings over Winston-Salem State and Norfolk State respectively.

South Carolina State won MEAC football titles in 1981 and 1982 and reached the second round of the I-AA championships both years.

In addition to NCAA post-season play, MEAC football teams have appeared in NCAA sanctioned bowl games. The MEAC was also instrumental in constructing the Freedom Bowl All-Star Classic and the Heritage Bowl.

In outdoor track and field, North Carolina Central won the first three MEAC outdoor track and field titles and finished fourth in the 1974 NCAA Division I Out-

door Track and Field Championships. North Carolina Central's Larry Black was a member of the 1972 Olympic 400-meter relay team that won the gold medal and the silver medal in the 200-meter dash.

MEAC women began outdoor track and field conference competition in 1980. Two years later, South Carolina State won the AIAW Division II Outdoor Track and Field National Championship (1982).

The MEAC initiated cross country and indoor track and field in 1981. Tennis and golf returned as MEAC-governed sports in 1981 after a five-year hiatus. Golf was discontinued after the 1982 championships.

In wrestling, Morgan State won 13 of the 24 conference championships. Individual wrestling championships were granted automatic entry into the NCAA championships in 1986. The MEAC discontinued wrestling as a conference-governed championship in 1995.

Baseball (discontinued following the 1977 season) along with women's volleyball were added as MEAC-governed sports in 1983. Women's softball became a MEAC sanctioned sport in 1992.

In 2003, Florida A&M became the first MEAC school to win a volleyball match in the NCAA Championship, with a first-round win over Winthrop. In 2004, the Lady Rattlers became the first HBCU team ranked in the Top 25 American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) national poll.

In softball, Bethune-Cookman earned the league's first-ever at-large bid to the NCAA Softball Championship in 2005. The Lady Wildcats defeated Florida, Central Florida and South Florida in the Florida Regional to become the first MEAC school to win a NCAA Division I Softball Regional. Bethune-Cookman ended the 2005 season with the leagues' first-ever rankings in the final softball polls, reaching No. 18 in the NFCA/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the USA Softball/ESPN.com Poll.

## This is Delaware State



Delaware State University looks to the future by embracing modern technology, while forming partnerships with universities around the world, along with government and private entities to better serve the higher education needs of all learners.

Founded in 1891 as a land-grant institution, Delaware State University is located in the state capital of Dover. A product of the Morrill Act of 1890, the institution was created in 1891 as a land grant institution by the 58th Delaware General Assembly and named the State College for Colored Students. When it opened its door to students for the first time in February 1892, it offered courses of studies in agriculture, chemistry, engineering, science and classical.

As the institution expanded its programs and infrastructure, the name was changed to Delaware State College in 1947 and to Delaware State University in 1993. What began in the late 1800s as a 100-acres that included two buildings and a workshop has evolved into a 400-acre site that was redesigned as a "pedestrian campus" in the mid-1990s. The university landscape currently has more than 30 building that includes nine academic buildings, 10 residential halls, two dining facilities, a six-floor library, an athletics/gymnasium facility and a modern main administration building.

In addition to the main campus' central location in Kent County, DSU also has satellite sites in Wilmington (New Castle County) to the north and in Georgetown (Sussex County) to the south.

In October 2007, the university completed construction of a new 17,000 square feet, state-of-the-art Strength and Conditioning Facility for its student-athletes, the first phase of a \$21 million Student Complex project. The construction of Phase II (a new Wellness Center for the general campus population and the community) and Phase III (a new Student Center) were both underway by early 2008. The two-story Wellness Center slated for completion by September 2009, and the student center's completion is estimate to occur by the winter of 2008-09.

In May 2007, Delaware State University conferred a school-record 591 degrees during its 116th Commencement Exercise, including 115 honors scholars as well as the first four graduates of its Educational Leadership Doctoral Program.

DSU is accredited by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle State Association of Colleges and Schools, as well as eight specialized academic

accrediting agencies.

Under the leadership of President Allen L. Ses

soms, the institution has made extraordinary progress towards fulfilling his visionary goals. A new academic structure has been put in place to more effectively organize the institution's 20 departments and 86 majors under its six colleges.

Over the last four years, the university has established its first five doctoral programs – Interdisciplinary Mathematics and Mathematical Physics, Educational Leadership, Applied Chemistry, Neuroscience and Optics. Over that period the University has also added five new master's degree programs in the areas of Sports Administration, Nursing, Educational Leadership, Art Education and Applied Optics. Currently the institution offers 63 undergraduate degrees, 22 master degrees and five doctoral programs.

Delaware State is the only HBCU nationwide with a Department of Airway Science that has its own planes and instructors. The Airway Science Program offers degree programs in the concentration areas of aircraft systems and airway science management. The DSU students who complete the certified flight school have a 96% pass rate on FAA flight examinations and many of them land jobs with major airlines.

The departments of Education, Hospitality and Tourism Management, Nursing, Social Work, and the

Didactic Program in Dietetics each hold national accreditations – meaning they continue to maintain the high national standards that their respective disciplines require in the preparation of future professionals in these fields. In December 2006, the College of Business earned its initial accreditation from the Association of Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) International. The achievement placed DSU in the top 10% of business schools worldwide to possess the accreditation, which confirms that the College of Business maintains the highest international standards established for business schools around the world.

The institution's William C. Jason Library is the largest repository of books and reference materials in Lower Delaware, containing more than 310,000 printed volumes. Along with its collection of micro books, microfiche, audio-visual volumes, bound periodicals, as well as its offerings of elec-

tronic books and journals, the library has a total holding of nearly 546,791.

The university is rapidly expanding its global reach to facilitate faculty/students exchanges, joint conferences, and research collaborations. Over the past few years, DSU has signed partnership agreements with institutions of higher education in Nigeria, Bangladesh, Serbia, Egypt, Cuba, China, England, Mauritania, Senegal and Uganda. These partnerships are added to the existing agreements DSU has with institutions in the countries of Namibia, Mexico, France, Senegal, Panama, Trinidad, and the Netherlands.

Connections to the community thrive under DSU's Arts Center/Gallery, which annually hosts Scholastic Arts and Writing Awards Exhibition, a statewide middle and high school program. DSU also serves as host sponsor and home base of VSA Arts of Delaware, an arts program for disabled citizens. The center is also the site of a variety of art exhibitions each year.

The Colleges of Mathematics, Natural Science and Technology, College of Agriculture and Related Sciences, and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences have collaborated with the State of Delaware and several other institutions of higher education to become part of an Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research in Delaware. The DSU team of researchers received \$1,936,000 in grant funding in April of 2005 to support the multi-year initiative and develop an Integrated Ecosystems Studies Program at the university.

A Dual Admissions Program now allows students enrolled at Delaware Technical and Community College to transfer seamlessly from their successfully completed two-year program to a connected undergraduate degree program at DSU.

Many DSU faculty members are conducting important research, enhancing DSU's land-grant mission and DSU's contributions to the nation's research enterprise, while at the same time enhancing the learning of students by giving them hands-on experience in the research work. A sampling of ongoing research activity includes:

The Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources is studying the feeding preferences of the American Oyster, the use of flow cytometry and sample preservation in Marine Phytoplankton analyses, harmful algal impacts on Oyster restoration, and en-

hancing the aquaculture and aquatic sciences program at DSU. In another research project, the same department is studying the use of native oyster as a biological filter that removes excess sediment, algae, nitrogen and phosphorus that pollute the Inland Bays in Sussex County, Delaware.

The department of Mathematics is currently conducting research for the U.S. Department of Defense in an effort to improve penetrating radar capability to better protect troop in Iraq, Afghanistan and other areas of wartime conflict.

Through a \$5 million grant from the National Science Foundation, DSU has established a Center for Research and Education in Optics Science and its Applications that will expand its existing research and capacity for optics technology enhancements and development. Research projects include the study of optical waves, the development of novel applied laser spectroscopy and data mining techniques as well as other research.

The DSU Applied Optics Center is investigating novel techniques in integrating various lightweight photonics and optical elements through its research in ground penetrating radar imaging, signal processing in data mining, and other areas. The research – to take place from 2003-2008 – has been funded by \$4 million in grants from the U.S. Department of Defense.

Federal funding has enabled the DSU Department of Chemistry to establish a Center for Hydrogen Storage Research. The department is researching ways in which hydrogen may be stored more effectively, which could lead to the development of energy-saving alternative fuel sources. The department is also researching and developing technologies to effectively recycle platinum and DuPont-manufactured Nafion from end-of-life fuel cell systems.

A biotechnology project currently underway to research how the wolf snail brain works that will assist in the further development of a model system for studying neurobiology of sensory systems and learning.

The Department of Biology has established a virus and molecular biology research laboratory where studies are being conducted on how plant viruses could be used to help in the application of plant vaccines.

With the Atlantic sturgeon's survival as a species challenged by poor water quality and past excessive fishing practices, a Natural Resources project is researching whether the Atlantic sturgeon is still spawning in the Delaware River area, which could lead to ways of restoring the population of the endangered fish.

DSU has established a Scanning Electron Microscopy Facility that will provide science faculty and students with an ultra-high magnification capability for its research and teaching activities. The state-of-the-art SEM can magnify three-dimensional objects and capture the record image areas as small as one-billionth.

In addition to Division I-AA football, the university fields NCAA Division I teams in men's and women's basketball, cross country, baseball, softball, track and field, tennis, wrestling, volleyball, soccer, bowling as well as its newest sport – women's equestrian.

During the 2007-08 academic year, Delaware State celebrated its first Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference football championships since 1991. The 2007 Hornets also made the first NCAA playoff appearance in team history, was recognized as American Sports Wire Black College National Champs and ranked 15th in the final poll of all Football Championship Subdivision teams.

The Hornets also celebrated their first MEAC softball championship and NCAA Tournament appearance last season. Softball senior Jessica Chrabaszcz became the first DSU student-athlete selected to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America First Team.

The equestrian team, in just its second year of competition, competed in the Varsity Equestrian National Championships in Waco, Texas., while the bowling team ranked 11th in the final National Tenpin Coaches Association weekly poll.

With school-record 82 academic all-conference honorees, Delaware State University topped the 2007-08 MEAC Commissioner's All-Academic List. The all-academic team recognized 585 student-athletes from the conference's 12 member institutions who achieved academic success during the 2007-08 academic school year. It marked the first time that Delaware State led all schools in the yearly list of MEAC scholar-athletes.

Working with the university's Division of Libraries and the athletics department academic support staff, Delaware State plans to launch a new Student-Athlete Academic Enrichment Center in the William Jason Library this fall.

The NCAA Division I Committee on Athletics Certification announced on July 31, 2006 that Delaware State University's Department of Athletics has been fully re-certified as an institution that operates in substantial conformity with the operating principles of the governing certification body.

## Dr. Claibourne D. Smith

### Acting President



Dr. Claibourne D. Smith was named Delaware State Acting President on August 20, 2008. A member of the DSU Board of Trustees since 1987, Dr. Smith served as chairman since 1993.

On December 31, 1998, Dr. Smith retired from DuPont as Vice President, Technology and Professional Development and Vice Chairman, Corporate Educational Aid. He joined DuPont in 1964 as a member of the Research Staff in the Central Research and Development Department and held a number of management positions in R&D, Sales, Marketing and Business Management. He held the position of Director of Marketing Liaison and Vice President Marketing in Corporate Plans Department.

Before his retirement, Dr. Smith administered and coordinated DuPont's Corporate Educational initiatives and was responsible for manpower planning and development for the Central Research and Development function.

Dr. Smith served on the Tuck Board of Overseers, Tuck School of Business at Dartmouth College from 1991 to 2000.

He served as President of the Board of Directors, Delaware Foundation on Science and Math Education; a private business supported foundation established to support Science/Math Education in Delaware for four years.

Dr. Smith was a member of the State of Delaware Board of Education from 1993 until 2006. He had been a Northeast Area Director and a member of the National Association of States Board of Education's (NASBE) Board of Directors and served as a member of NASBE's study group on "Coordination and Accountability in Teacher Education" and chaired the NASBE study group on "The Changing Faces of America's Children".

He served as a member of the Advisory Committee on Education Statistics of the U.S. Department of Education and a member of the National Science Foundation's CEOSE (Committee on Equal Opportunities in Science and Engineering).

Dr. Smith is a member of the board of directors, Metropolitan Wilmington Urban League and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Delaware State University. He also is a member of the Board of Directors of WSFS bank.

Dr. Smith earned B.S. and M.S. Degrees in chemistry from the University of Denver in 1959 and 1961, respectively, and a Ph.D. in organic chemistry from the University of Oregon in 1964.

Dr. Smith and his wife Roseann, of Chester, Pa., reside in Centreville, Del.

## Candy Young Sanders

### Acting Director of Athletics



Candy Young Sanders was named Delaware State University Acting Director of Athletics on March 4, 2009. She has served as an Assistant Director of Athletics and Senior Woman Administrator for the university's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics since July 2008.

In addition, she is in her third season as DSU's Women's Cross Country/Track & Field Head Coach.

Sanders is a member of the Delaware State University Long-Range Strategic Planning Monitoring Committee, and serves as chairperson of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference (MEAC) Woman-of-the-Year Committee.

Since arriving at Delaware State, Sanders has guided three performers to NCAA East Regional competition. Nekisha Franklin competed in the 2007 East Regional in the 100-meter dash and 200-meter dash. In 2008, Franklin qualified for the East Regional in 100. Cuquie Melville competed in the 2007 and '08 NCAA Regional in the 400-meter hurdles. In addition, Melville captured the MEAC Indoor Pentathlon and Outdoor Heptathlon championships in each of the last two years. Jasmine Rogers was a 2007 NCAA Regional qualifier in the 100-meter hurdles.

The former world-class athlete has nearly 20 years of Division I coaching experience.

Prior to arriving at Delaware State, Sanders worked with two-time Olympic gold-medalist Roger Kingdom as his assistant men's and women's track & field/cross country coach at California University of Pennsylvania in 2005. In addition to her coaching duties, Sanders was recruiting coordinator for the program.

From 2002-04, Sanders was an assistant men's and women's track & field/cross country coach at the University of Pittsburgh. While there, she helped lead the women's team to three Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) titles. In addition, the Panthers produced two NCAA championship qualifiers, eight NCAA regional qualifiers and 24 Big East championship qualifiers during her tenure.

Sanders also recruited four nationally ranked high school athletes to the Pittsburgh program. The previous seven years (1994-2001), Sanders was an assistant men's and women's coach at the Ohio State University. While at OSU, she coached Donna Merriman to NCAA championships in the indoor and outdoor hurdles. Sanders also helped produce 12 All-Americans and several record holders. While at Ohio State, she also served as Head Coach of the 1997 USA World University Team and was an executive board member for USA Track & Field.

From 1989-92, Sanders was an assistant men's and women's coach at Seton Hall University. She helped lead the Pirate women to a Big East Championship and trained several All-Americans.

Sanders is a member of the United States Track & Field/Cross Country Coaches Association Strategic Planning Committee, and previously served on the executive committee for USA Track & Field for eight years.

Before embarking on her coaching career, Sanders was internationally known as a record-setting hurdler.

A 100-meter hurdler on the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team, she also holds two indoor world records and a Junior American record. In addition, Sanders is a two-time National Indoor Champion, four-time NCAA indoor champion and eight-time NCAA All-American.

Sanders earned a B.A. in Biological Education from Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, N.J., in 1985, and a master's in Sports Management from Delaware State last year.

In 1979, she was the Sports Illustrated National High School Athlete-of-the-Year.

## Academic Services



The DSU Academic Enrichment Center, scheduled to open this spring, will provide Delaware State student-athletes with the very best tools necessary to meet the demanding needs and goals of today's college athlete. The 3,500-square-foot center includes computers, an area for individual tutoring as well as a spacious study lounge. Student-athletes have accessibility to the Academic Enrichment Center and the excellent staff throughout the entire year.

The Academic Enrichment Program at Delaware State University is designed to be a full-service program with the goal of providing the support and services necessary to enhance the total development of the DSU student-athlete. The program is focused on the unique needs and demands of student-athletes at DSU and fosters the cultivation of skills that allow for the development of potential in the classroom, on the field and for the future.

In addition to the emphasis on the classroom and academic success, the Academic Enrichment Program provides support and programming in the areas of career development, community service, personal development and leadership. The athletic success of our student-athletes is supported through our coaching staffs as well as the various support staffs provided for them, including the strength and conditioning staff, athletic training staff, facilities staff and the equipment room staff. In addition, programming in the areas of nutrition, performance enhancement, leadership development, sports agents and gambling, ethical behavior, sportsmanship and amateurism are provided throughout the academic year.

### DSU Academic Facts

During the 2007-08 academic school year, Delaware State produced 82 MEAC scholar athletes (more than any other school in the conference). It marked the fourth-straight year DSU increased the number of honorees on the list from the year before. In 2007, 77 Delaware State student-athletes were named to that year's Commissioner's All-Academic List. Seventy-five Hornets were named to 2005-06 list, while 35 were named during the 2004-05 season.

All 18 DSU squads finished the 2007-08 season with a 2.6 GPA or higher.

Jessica Chrabaszcz (Softball) and Josh Brite (Football) finished the 2007-08 year with a perfect 4.0.

Jessica Chrabaszcz was named to the 2008 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Team (First Team), becoming the first DSU athlete to earn such distinction.

Three DSU student-athletes earned ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District II honors. Jessica Chrabaszcz (softball); Peter Gaertner (football), Nick Richmond (football).

Both punter Josh Brite and center Nick Richmond were named to the Football Championship Academic All-Star Team.

Punter Josh Brite was awarded the 2007-08 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Post-Graduate Scholarship.

## Sports Medicine



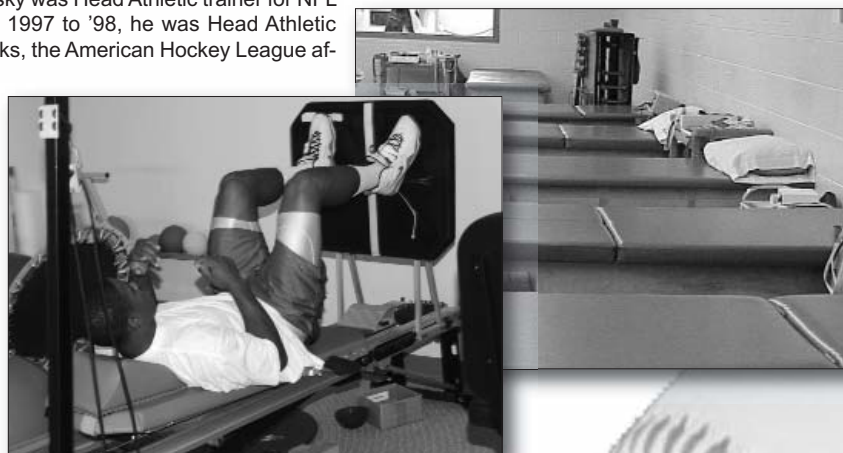

Under the guidance of Director of Sports Medicine Bill Yanowsky and Associate Athletic Trainers Cara Cordrey, Nicloe Hoffman and Elyse Warns, the DSU Sports Medicine staff offers comprehensive health care with special emphasis placed on injury prevention methods. The Sports Medicine staff offers daily service to every student-athlete.

Bill Yanowsky was appointed as Delaware State's Director of Sports Medicine in July 2006 after serving the previous seven years at San Jose State University. He was an assistant athletic trainer at San Jose State until being appointed as Associate Head Athletic Trainer in 2002. In 1999, Yanowsky was Head Athletic trainer for NFL Europe's Barcelona Dragons. From 1997 to '98, he was Head Athletic Trainer for the Cincinnati Mighty Ducks, the American Hockey League affiliate of the NHL Anaheim Mighty Ducks. Yanowsky was an intern for the Anaheim Mighty Ducks from 1996 to '98. He earned a master's

in kinesiology from San Jose State in 1999 and a bachelor's in physical education from the school in 1993. Yanowsky was a graduate assistant athletic trainer at San Jose State from 1994 to '96.

It is the mission of the DSU strength and conditioning program to maximize agility, speed and strength and decrease the potential for injury in a manner that is safe and intense for each student-athlete. In this regard, year long strength and conditioning programs at DSU are designed specific to each student-athlete. Programs are evaluated and monitored continuously and adjusted as necessary to reach optimal gains.

Delaware State University student-athletes benefit from a first-rate strength and conditioning facility. The first phase of DSU's \$50 million Strength and Conditioning/Wellness Center/Student Union opened during the fall of 2008. A dedication ceremony for the facility was attended by local and state elected officials and many former Delaware State student-athletes, including Philadelphia Eagles starting center Jamal Jackson and former NFL standout Darnerien McCants.

The strength and conditioning center is a 17,000 square feet, state-of-the-art complex with all the amenities of a major college facility. The center is connected to the north end of the Memorial Hall main gymnasium, and is solely for use by DSU student-athletes. The facility includes a strength and conditioning area, laundry room, offices for conditioning coaches and locker rooms for men's and women's basketball. The facility features a two-story entry and lobby, ticketing area and 9,000 square feet of open strength and conditioning space.

Phase II involves the construction of a two-story wellness center specifically for the general student population and the public. Construction began in August 2007 and is slated to be completed in the winter of 2009. First floor plans include the renovation of the existing auxiliary gymnasium and the construction of a new basketball court, as well as offices, concession space, women's and men's locker rooms and a swimming pool.

The second floor will feature a fitness and weight training area (featuring mainly Nautilus equipment), and a track that will run through the fitness and weight training area, and above the basketball court.
